Never before has our guiding whakataukī 'me rangatira te tū' (to embody the qualities of leadership) and our underlying values of kotahitanga, manaakitanga, kia tika / kia pono and kia māia been more relevant. These core values remind us of the behaviours we all need to role model in support of our taitama and kōhine.

InZone kōhine Waikamania Seve was named as Deputy Head Girl at Epsom Girls Grammar School and Miriama Soutar was selected as Louisa Wall's Youth MP in partnership with Te Ropu Wahine Maori i Te Ora (Māori Women's Welfare League).

Te Awa Neumann and Torah Apineru have been named Prefects at Auckland Grammar School.

The board continues to strongly support our Tumuaki / CEO, Jason Whatuira, as he so proficiently leads our new hostel boarding leadership team of Jamie McQueen and Karllie Clifton. I also acknowledge all other InZone kaimahi who bring their extensive and varied skills and knowledge to the fore for our rangatahi.

InZone Education Foundation is a New Zealand registered charitable trust that aims to inspire and support Māori and Pasifika youth to take their place in the cultural, economic and civic leadership of Aotearoa New Zealand.

We do this by providing kāinga (hostels) which are “InZone” for high performing schools who we partner with to ensure students achieve top educational outcomes. Our kāinga enable our students to live and learn in a supportive whānau environment with a Māori kaupapa underpinned by Christian values. In this environment, we aim to support, inspire and empower our rangatahi to achieve to their full potential.

InZone Education Foundation’s vision is Māori & Pasifika who are confident and competent in the two worlds of Te Aō Māori and Te Aō Pākēha and carry themselves like rangatira.

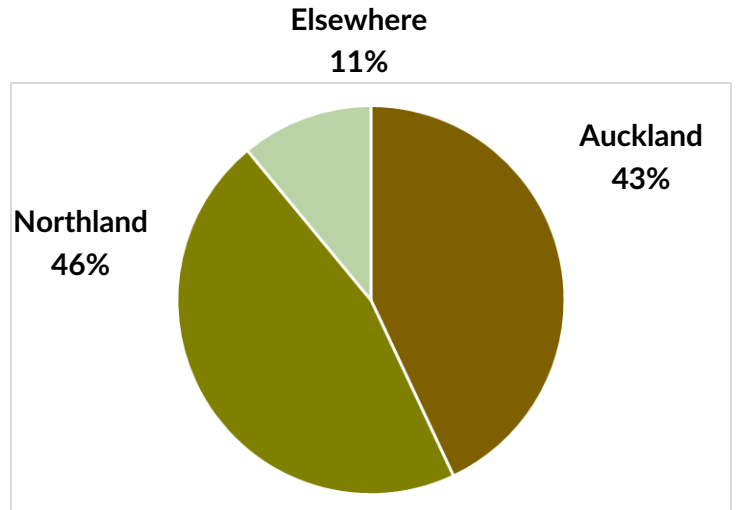

Where is home?

More than three-quarters of our rangatahi come from low socio-economic areas of Northland and South Auckland.

Our rangatahi are often from families facing financial disadvantage and economic hardship. This is evidenced by the fact that 59% (48% in 2020) receive financial assistance from the Ministry of Education or other sources. This is a ten percent increase since before COVID-19 hit in 2020 which impacted many of our whānau through reduced hours of work and redundancies.

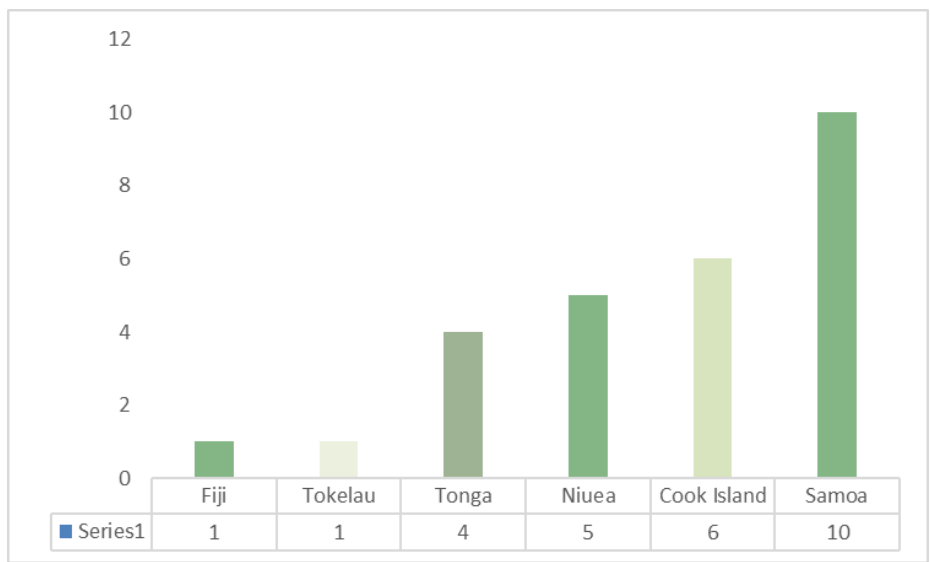

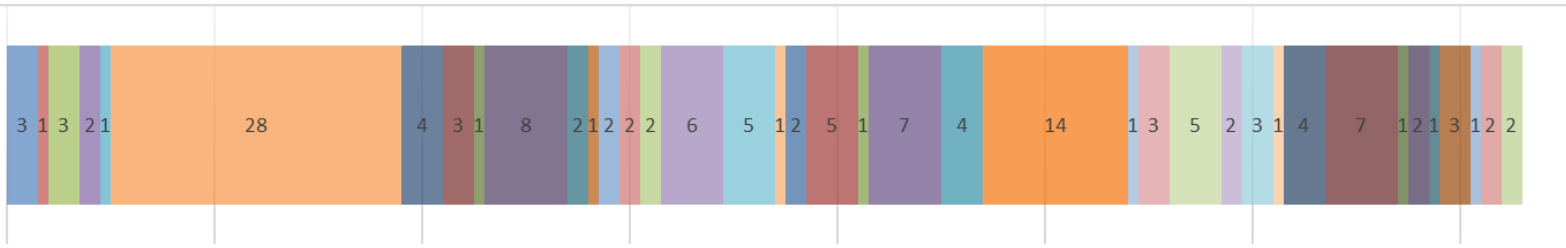

We congratulate our rangatahi to all their sporting successes. Ka Mau te Wehi!



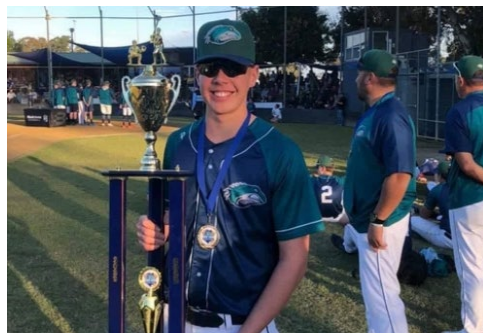

AKO (ACADEMICS)

Educational success is not just about the school our rangatahi attend, but also about the environment in which they live, the support they receive and the values that are embedded in that care.

Our rangatahi are not selected based on their academic ability but rather by their willingness to embrace all the opportunities that InZone offers.

InZone provides access to top performing schools and the necessary, year round academic support program required to succeed in these schools.

Most of our leavers progress into tertiary education but we equally support pathway choices leading into other qualifications such as apprenticeships.



Our academic support programme includes

- two tutoring sessions per week in partnership with Kip McGrath
- daily 2 hour supervised study sessions
- one compulsory academic weekend wānanga per term for exam preparations and

Our Ako managers keep everyone on track through academic monitoring and ensure all our rangatahi receive the support they need to achieve their academic potential.

The first half of 2022 remained challenging due to the disruptions caused by changing covid regulations and sicknesses both at school and the kāinga. Our team adapted to the changes by switching to online based learning, providing access to devices and support with device and platform uses, as well as giving our rangatahi extra, one on one tutoring support.

OUR PATHWAY STRATEGY

is interest based, skill centred & future focussed.

We work in partnership with tertiary providers, local employers for work experience and internships, offer workshops and invite speakers to stimulate the interests of our rangatahi and to broaden their pathways knowledge and options available to them.

By overlaying their interests with their skills and abilities we narrow the playing field and put a reality check on their choices. All this whilst keeping focussed on skills that will still be in demand in the future in a world increasingly driven by technology.

We are in the process of formalising our pathways strategy (methods and practices) that will provide our staff with a toolset to guide and support our rangatahi on their path.

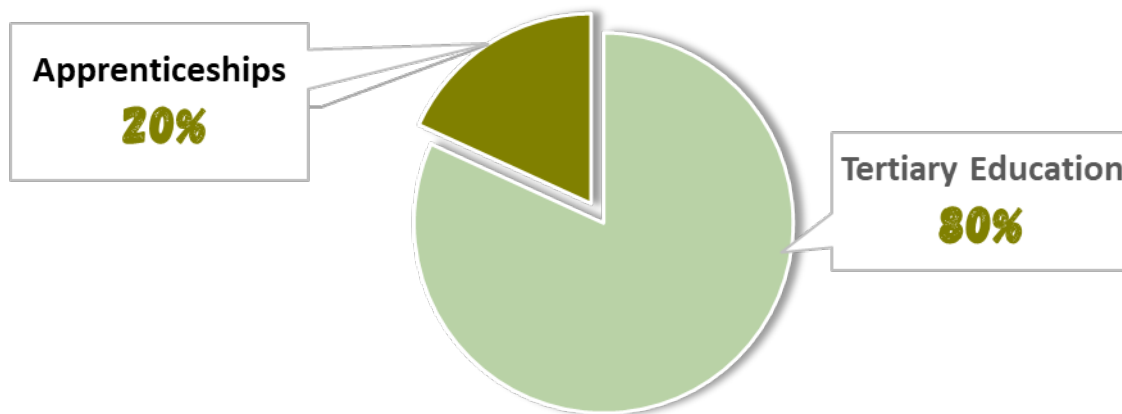
AGS has a great pathway programme into the trades, which includes partnerships to help boys transition into apprenticeships. We supported our boys through this process. We ensure rangatahi leave InZone with a preferred career pathway, understand the steps needed and have the skills and tools required. This enables them to successfully transition into their chose pathway.

Leavers 2022 pathways

The majority of our 2022 leavers have enrolled in tertiary education.

Six are going to university, one enrolled for a teaching certificate and one is starting at Toi Whakaari to study drama.

In addition we have one rangatahi that started an electrical engineering apprenticeship, whilst another has joined the Royal NZ Navy to specialize in marine engineering.

& PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT

Heartland Bank Internship

Monique Forbes, CMO warmly welcomed the new InZone interns Breize Rawiri, Derek Kupu, Torah Apineru and Te Awa Neumann on their first day of their six week paid internships programme.

Heartland Bank is one of InZone's key partners and since the inception of this program in 2017 we have had 38+ InZone rangatahi complete the program. An amazing opportunity for them to learn about life in the corporate world.



UBS Pathways Workshop

Chris Simcock, the Country Head of UBS New Zealand and his team warmly welcomed out rangatahi at their CBD offices.

The workshop was filled with valuable advice and fun activities and gave our seniors a taste of a corporate environment. It left everyone buzzing and our rangatahi requested to make this an annual event.



PMP - Programming Māori & Pasifika Potential Workshop

The purpose of this workshop was to get kids interested in career pathways available in the digital sector. Like in a start up competition, teams were given a social issue and had to create digital technology solutions. Our rangatahi created a Maori Mental Health app, they went from ideation to create a prototype, had to pitch it to potential investors and were paired with an industry mentor for development.

A great event led by Māori Tech innovators from companies such as Rocket Lab and ARA Journeys, aimed to awaken, inspire and ignite the interest of our rangatahi in tech, innovation and entrepreneurship pathways!

Karakia for Te Kāinga Wānanga

On the 17th of June Ngāti Whātua Ōrākei blessed our kāinga with mana whenua. It was a significant event in the history of InZone and a memorable, beautiful dawn celebration for all staff, rangatahi and guests alike.

Official Opening of Te Kāinga Wānanga

On the 31st of July, Bruce Plested officially opened InZone's redeveloped headquarters and kāinga at 99 Owens Road after almost 3 years of redevelopment. As Bruce addressed our rangatahi, he spoke about the importance of education.

His passion for equitable access to education is the motivation behind his long support of InZone over the years.

Rangatahi responded with a moving haka to Bruce in gratitude.



This project included demolishing an outdated building and replacing it with a purpose-built 38-bed hostel (increasing total capacity to 60 beds), incorporating a new commercial kitchen to service both our girls' and boys' kāinga, dining and lounge facilities as well as refurbishing existing dorms and office spaces. James Mace led the Property Committee and his tireless efforts greatly contributed to the success of this project. We are grateful to Dominion Construction for their fantastic work in the build under the leadership of Director Kerin Russell-Smith.

A beautiful ceremony marked this momentous occasion, incorporating our Māori and Pasifika tikanga as InZone celebrated the completion of the multi-million-dollar project, funded by our generous benefactor.

SCHOLARSHIPS DEBORAH GEORGE AWARDED ONZM

We are very proud to celebrate Deborah George's appointment as Officer of the New Zealand Order of Merit (ONZM) in the 2022 New Year Honours for Services to Education and Governance.

Deborah received a Service to InZone award in 2020 in recognition of her relentless mahi in a voluntary capacity for the kaupapa. She was instrumental in the establishment of Inzone in 2011 and its growth ever since. A founding Board Trustee, Deborah completed a four-year term as Board Chair 2016-2020.

The concept of raukura in Te Aō Māori is based on the underlying belief that once you reach a certain level in your life journey, you must then recycle that knowledge back into the communities you learned from.

Raukura is not a leavers badge, raukura is a concept of responsibility to give back. Raukura directly implies that on graduating from school and Inzone, the essence of all learning and opportunities obtained, are given back, reinvested into the next generation at Inzone and the leavers own communities. Reciprocity and redistribution of knowledge are two traits that a rangatira must possess. Therefore, the concept of raukura fits with our whakataukī, 'Me rangatira te tū'.

It is fantastic to be updated in the lives of our raukura. Our InZone whānau has been forged through these years of growing and learning and experiencing life together.

In July we had the pleasure to welcome a few of our Raukura to the opening celebrations of Te Hoare Nikau Reti-Beazley, who is currently doing a Health Science degree and is part of the Māori Public Health Leadership team at Hāpai Te Hauora, spoke on behalf of the raukura and expressed his joy at seeing the love and the mahi that continues to be poured into InZone. Nikau, Denzel Wiki, Logan Hohaia and Johnno Stevens-Apaipora were amazed at the difference in the kāinga following the refurbishment since their years boarding with us. Rangatahi with a strong cultural identity have better mental health outcomes. They are more likely to have positive and enduring relationships, are happier and better placed to succeed. InZone is a Māori kaupapa underpinned by Christian values that celebrates the cultures of Te Moananui a Kiwa (Pasifika) through daily rituals of waiata, hymn, karakia, performance, and the proper acknowledgment of Māori and Pasifika language.

More than just a hostels in our kāinga our rangatahi are immersed in a home like environment where we provide wrap around support from staff and peers alike, so they can settle in quickly and develop a sense of belonging. We strive to create a supportive, whānau oriented and culturally appropriate environment that will give our students every opportunity to succeed.

In addition to academic opportunities we help to prepare our rangatahi for life which has long-lasting positive impacts on their holistic wellbeing.

Whānau and alumni feedback shows that InZone

- builds character, instilling important values in our rangatahi such as leadership and prioritising collective over individual needs
- increases confidence, resilience and self-esteem
- increases exposure to new worldviews and experiences
- improves social skills, communications and conflict management
- teaches the importance of a good work ethic, discipline and good habits
- enables rangatahi to develop strong, long-lasting bonds with their brothers and sisters at the kāinga
